SMITHERS PRIMARY CARE CLINIC

SMITHERS CLINIC EXPANDS TO INCLUDE CULTURALLY SAFE CARE FOR LOCAL FIRST NATIONS

THE NEW EXPANSION TO THE SMITHERS PRIMARY CARE CLINIC MEANS LOCAL FIRST NATIONS AND OTHER RESIDENTS CAN NOW ACCESS TRADITIONAL HEALING as well as Western medicine in a culturally safe environment.

The result of strong collaboration between the First Nations Health Authority (FNHA), Northern Health, the Pacific Northwest Division of Family Practice the Ministry of Health, and the local First Nations community in Witset, the clinic will serve as a model for the region.

The goal is to “create a shared space that ensures First Nations communities have a voice at the table and their members can receive culturally safe healthcare,” said Trish Howard, FNHA’s primary care manager.

This site offers wrap-around care inclusive of First Nations traditional knowledge that

will staff an Elder, general practitioner, nurse practitioners, primary care assistants, a clinical pharmacist, dietitian and a physiotherapist.

The clinic, part of the Bulkley Valley Witset Primary Care Network, provides a team-based model of care that is inclusive of traditional First Nations healing knowledge and wisdom and reflects the culture of the unceded lands it occupies.

A formal ceremony to celebrate the expansion is planned July at 3842 Third Avenue in Smithers.



The community of Witset, Northern Health, the FNHA, the Pacific Northwest Division of Family Practice and the Ministry of Health collaborated on this project to include traditional healing at the clinic in Smithers.

EVERYDAY HEROES

THE STRENGTHENING HELPERS PROGRAM, FACILITATED BY EMBER OF HOPE COUNSELING AND TRAINING SERVICES, IS HALFWAY THROUGH TRAINING 39 COMMUNITY MEMBERS

to aid and support those facing health and wellness challenges, especially in rural and remote areas.

The First Nations Health Authority sponsored the one-year Indigenous-only training. It empowers natural helpers with technical knowledge and confidence to make a real difference without having to study for years. And the helpers use skills and experience they already have.

"We wanted to focus on delivering culturally appropriate healing skills that incorporate awareness of unique cultural intricacies and historical trauma," said FNHA's Carlos Colindres, FNHA director of health emergency management.

The training includes: mental health awareness, trauma-informed care, suicide prevention and cultural safety, while emphasizing self-care.

"These natural helpers live in the community and respond to crisis and are filled with empathy and compassion. We are so grateful to have their support," said Sandra McArthur, FNHA's crisis response coordinator.

Participants finished the classroom sessions and will now enter into a six-month mentorship program to complete the full training.

WITH JIM CAMPBELL, REGIONAL MANAGER MENTAL HEALTH & WELLNESS



THE TOXIC DRUG CRISIS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA CONTINUES TO AFFECT NORTHERN INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES MORE THAN OTHER POPULATIONS; which is why FNHA North Region has been making some innovations.

Taking direction from communities, we hosted a 3-day Addictions Engagement and Knowledge Exchange Forum in Prince George at the end of March. Over 200 Elders, health workers and leaders attended. They provided

spring. The team teaches community members how to support people who use substances to do so safely, while providing Naloxone training, kits, and other harm reduction supplies. One practical tool is a drug strip that can detect poisons before drugs are taken.

In addition to mental health counsellors, we partner with Indigenous organizations like IRSSS (Indian Residential School Survivors Society) to provide cultural support and traditional wellness workers to be there for community members. We also partner with Northern Health, and telehealth to support community members who experience dislocation, anxiety and other mental health challenges during traumatic times.

1,000 recommendations; listing services and programs that are doing well, and identifying gaps and areas where supports and changes are needed.

The challenges identified are the lack of detox and withdrawal services, delays in accessing treatment, limited staffing and resources, lack of core sustainable funding, trauma from colonialism and residential schools, and a lack of culturally safe services.

A number of effective responses were also identified at the forum; land-based healing, increased support for traditional healing, community prevention and awareness programs, and prevention training and education for community members and health teams.

The FNHA North harm reduction team visited 33 of 55 communities last year and will visit 22 communities this

FNHA North also provides funding to all communities to provide traditional wellness and land-based services in each community as part of their Regional Envelope Funding (REF). This will be the second year this has occurred as we understand traditional ways are often more effective than Western options.

We know the toxic drug crisis is having a huge impact on all communities, members and families and more is required. That's why we will continue looking for solutions and responding to community inputs.

EVACUATION ALERT

This is your “it’s time to get ready to go” warning. Gather up clothing, personal items, medications, emergency plan, etc., and listen for next steps. [Here’s a list of what to pack.](#)

EVACUATION ORDER

It’s time to go! Local emergency officials will identify what routes are safe to take. Wait until the order has been rescinded to return home.
